Guest Speaker Ed Brogan Visits Kiski Presbytery

The Kiskiminetas Presbytery met in a stated meeting at the Slate Lick Church on June 27th. Worship was led by host pastor Rev. Mark Davis, Rev. Lonnie Long, and special guest Rev. Dr. Ed Brogan.

2007 Budget and Per Capita

Presbytery received the proposed 2007 budget as a first reading. Action was taken to adopt a presbytery per capita of \$16.60, bringing the total per capita figure for 2007 to \$24.39.

Socks Galore

Presbyterian Women Moderator Sally Early reported on the Spring Gathering at Dayton Glade Run, attended by 103 women. Donations of socks for the Arcadia Clothing Mission totaled over 2,800 pairs. Collecting money for our church camps is the PW Synod Project; it will be collected at the Fall Gathering. Sally reminded people of the Churchwide Gathering this summer, as well as the New Windsor Mission Trip in September.

A Ministry to Those Who Serve our Nation

Rev. Dr. Ed Brogan, Director of the Presbyterian Council for Chaplains, explained the work of the Presbyterian Council for Chaplains and Military Personnel (PCCMP). PCCMP is an inter-church agency which serves 4 denominations. This key ministry welcomes the support of churches and presbyteries, and Ed thanked Kiski for our support.

G.A. & Synod Commissioners Report

Rev. Tom Jones and Elder Connie Bytner, G.A. Commissioners, and Luke Speck, Youth Advisory Delegate, reported on the recently concluded 217th General Assembly meeting. Rev. Gary Lyon reported on the Synod Gathering in West Virginia.

Inquirer Moved to Candidacy

Presbytery approved moving Dan Clark of the First Church, Clarion congregation from Inquirer to Candidate status. Dan is a student at the Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary. He spoke of his faith journey, sensing that it was "crafted by Jesus."

Rwanda Team Commissioned

Diaconal Committee Chair Kay Smith presented a brief powerpoint about Rwanda and the team of 9 people who plan to visit there in September on a fact-finding and mission study trip. The team consists of Chuck Bollinger, Rev. Marty Cartmell, Sally & Fred Carrier, Donna Douth, Rev. Boyd Edmondson, Betty Grunstra, Jack Loucks, and Kay Smith. General Presbyter Wayne Yost commissioned the 7 members who were present. Kay announced that a \$900 Synod grant had been received for the trip. She also described the recently completed West Virginia mission trips which involved 21 Kiski folks.

Coming Soon to Kiski: the Acts 16:5 Initiative

Rev. Erin Cox-Holmes previewed the Acts 16:5 Initiative, a program of congregational revitalization and transformation, and encouraged each congregation to participate. She then introduced Gary Gibson, Commissioned Lay Pastor from the Washington Presbytery, who spoke to his presbytery's positive experiences with the program.

Moderators Appointed

The following moderators were appointed: Rev. Mark Davis, West Glade Run; Rev. Art Seaman, Crooked Creek; and Rev. Jon Speck, Faith, Kittanning.

Peace, Unity, and Purity

After much discussion, Presbytery approved a motion offered by Rev. Rick Hurley, urging all churches to:

- ❖ enter a time of discernment and prayer for the peace, unity, and purity of the PC (USA)
- ❖ encourage the study and discussion of Scriptures, the Confessions, and the Peace, Unity, and Purity Task Force Report
- ❖ show forbearance to all those wrestling with what it means to be faithful in these tenuous times

Next Meeting

Rev. Marty Cartmell, Moderator, thanked Rev. Davis and the Slate Lick congregation for their hospitality. The meeting adjourned at 3:55 p.m. after prayer. The next stated Presbytery meeting will take place on September 12, 2006 at 7:00 p.m. at the Gilgal Church.

Seeking to be faithful to the Great Commission of Christ and to fulfill the Great Ends of the Church, the mission of Kiskiminetas Presbytery is:

- ▶ To be a partner in mission and ministry with the Sessions of the Presbytery, the Synod and the General Assembly;
- ▶ To provide care and oversight for the congregations and minister members of the Presbytery;
- ▶ To serve as a judicial court of the church; and
- ▶ To affirm the connectional relationships of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)

Between Me & Thee

When I was in college (long, long ago and far, far away), at Pikeville College in the Eastern Kentucky coal mining hills, I was blessed with the opportunity to serve two small congregations. One congregation was located near an ever burning slag pile. It was the smaller of the two congregations. About 15 people would gather each Sunday morning for worship. Many of those attending sat toward the rear of the worship area. Generally, there were six or seven empty pews, on each side of the center aisle, between the pulpit and the first worshiper. On some Sundays, if the wind were coming down the valley the smell of the burning slag pile permeated our worship experience. The strong sulphur odor reminded me of Dante's description of hell.

That small congregation was not unlike many of our congregations. Once that congregation had over 100 members when the mines were going full-tilt and the mining village had a strong population. One of the favorite hymns of that congregation was "Revive Us, Again." We sang it frequently. It is a rather lively hymn. The refrain goes like this:

*Hallelujah! Thine the glory.
Hallelujah! Amen.
Hallelujah! Thine the glory.
Revive us again.*

I often wondered about the prayer, which this hymn raises, to be revived. Does that mean we are dead? The first definition of revive at dictionary.com is *To bring back to life or consciousness; resuscitate*. No amount of CPR was going to take that congregation back to life as they had known it in former days. However, another definition of revive is

To regain health, vigor, or good spirits.
Now, that is possible and is reflected in the last verse of the hymn.

*Revive us again;
Fill each heart with Thy love;
May each soul be rekindled
With fire from above.*



In this presbytery we have a glorious opportunity for our congregations to experience what the hymn prays for. In other places in this Newsletter and on the Presbytery website www.kiskipby.org you will find information about the ACTS 16:5 initiative led by Western Pennsylvania's own Stan Ott. Acts 16:5 (NRSV) states,
So the churches were strengthened in faith and increased in numbers daily.

I pray each of our congregations will send a team to the first ACTS 16:5 workshop and then will decide to commit to this means of finding revival and strengthening of congregational life toward more faithful and fulfilling discipleship.

We cannot expect to be revived to the way things were in what we may remember as the "good old days." We can expect to regain health, vigor, and enthusiasm for the Gospel. We have to admit that we have been in failing health, that our vigor has slackened, and our spirits have been downcast. Do not let this opportunity to be revived in health, vigor and spirit to slip by.

101st New Wilmington Missionary Conference,

New Wilmington, PA

July 22-28, 2006



Carrying its tradition of mobilizing individuals and churches for mission into a second century, the 101st New Wilmington Missionary Conference will be held at Westminster College in New Wilmington, PA from July 22-28th. About 1,000 delegates and staff from across the nation and around the world will come together for a week of Bible study, spiritual enrichment, and Christian fellowship. Meetings are open to anyone who wishes to attend.

Lead speaker for Saturday, July 22, is the Rev. Dr. Tony Campolo. Dr. Campolo has worked to create, nurture and support programs for "at-risk" children in cities across North America, and has helped establish schools and universities in several developing countries. He will speak both Saturday and Sunday night.

"Changes in Presbyterian Mission" will be the timely theme of special sessions on Tuesday afternoon, July 25th. Dr. Scott Sunquist, Professor of Mission and Evangelism at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, will address a lunch group. Other denominational and missional leaders will share their insights throughout the afternoon.

Another special feature on Tuesday is "Come and See." Pastors and youth ministers are invited to come and learn about the conference. A free lunch and dinner are included for those who register by contacting the conference office.

The theme for the event is "Look at the nations, and watch and be utterly amazed. For I am going to do something in your days that you would not believe, even if you were told" (Habakkuk 1:5). Missionaries from over 20 countries will be recounting some of those amazing things.

The purpose of the conference is to deepen the missionary spirit in the church. Speakers will urge attendees to follow Jesus Christ more closely and lift up the call to take the good news of Jesus to those who have not heard or received it. Other speakers will share some of the great things God is doing in the world and how the number of Christian believers is multiplying in many places. 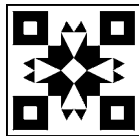

Gilgal Church Honors Longtime Organist

Ruth Elkin first started playing the piano at the **Gilgal Presbyterian Church** near Marion Center when she was 12 years old. She later learned to play the organ by practicing on a pump organ in her home, which was on the farm next to the church. Now she and her niece, Maureen Cribbs, share organ duties for Sunday services. On May 28, the Gilgal congregation honored Ruth for 75 years as pianist/organist in the worship service, which was followed by a covered dish dinner on the lawn. This special day was a part of the monthly events that celebrate the 200th anniversary of the church. On July 23, the church will hold worship with communion, followed by a covered-dish luncheon and contemporary music concert.

Piece by Piece - Creative Quilting in Brookville

The women in the C.E. Wilson Sunday School class of the **Brookville Church** began a quilt project following September 11, 2001. As an outlet for the intense emotions the attack had caused, members decided to create a quilt which included their favorite Bible verses, a visible reminder of faith in the midst of despair. Quilt blocks and verses soon far exceeded the number needed for a quilt, so a revised plan was adopted: lap quilts for church members residing in nursing homes. Eventually, baby quilts were added to the goal. While several members have participated, only Helen McKinley has actually quilted them. Helen learned quilting as a child from her mother, practicing on small scrap quilts created for her dolls. Only one lap quilt has been completed by someone other than Helen: the one lovingly presented to her by the group of grateful women who have made the quilt tops and appreciated her gift of quilting. This quilt and others were displayed on June 11 before being given away.



Grace Church Celebrates 200 Years

Grace Church in Kittanning celebrated its 200th anniversary on June 11. The church history relates that the Rev. Joseph W. Henderson, a ministerial member of the Presbytery of Redstone, preached the first sermon given in Kittanning by a Presbyterian minister in June 1806. The first church building was erected at the corner of Jacob and Jefferson streets, and the second church was built on the same site, but was larger to serve the growing Presbyterian population. By 1880, members felt the church was too small and began planning for a larger structure. In 1888, a stone Romanesque architecture church was built at Jefferson and Arch streets, the site of today's church. Rev. Art Seaman, pastor, said the church plans to hold a larger celebration open to the public in September.

Centennial Celebration at Clymer

The **First Presbyterian Church of Clymer** will be celebrating its centennial on Saturday and Sunday, August 19 and 20. There will be worship services and fellowship meals on both days. Five former ministers are scheduled to participate in the services over the course of the celebration. Saturday will include the dedication of a Memorial Stone to honor all of the past members who have gone to be with the Lord and will also feature local historian, John Busovicki, giving a short presentation on the history of the church and its relationship with the local community. Anniversary Plans at Concord Church in Parker

Members of the **Concord Church** are planning special events to celebrate their 200th anniversary. Tentatively scheduled are a hymn sing in the fall, a "remembering night" this winter, and hosting a special musical group next spring. In addition, work on a church cookbook and a church history continues.

West Virginia Workcamp - "A Great Experience"

Sally Carrier, member of the **Shiloh, St. Marys** congregation, was one of 11 persons from our presbytery who worked in Gilbert/Lenore, W.V. for a week in June. Their goal was to help rebuild a community devastated by hurricane floods in 2004. The Kiski group, the 12th to work on this particular home, put up wall board, mudded and sanded, then painted walls in the home of an 82-year old woman. The team reports that "the people were lovely Appalachians with warm hearts and open arms. The church is alive and well in the community, and after the floods of 2004, rebuilding and growth are happening."

Mission Needs

Jeff's role is to facilitate PC(USA) relationships with partner churches, institutions, and mission personnel in Cameroon, Congo, Equatorial Guinea, and Rwanda. He also is a resource for U.S. congregations who are in a relationship with one of our partners in the region. In keeping with his experience as an educator, Jeff's special focus is on the educational work of our partners.

At the meeting, he served the Team by answering their questions regarding protocol and expectations of the group during the trip. Since this is not a work project trip, he suggested that mutuality in our relations should be the main focus. Some of the considerations should be:

- Value BEING, not always DOING
- Focus on relationships vs. charity.
- Acknowledge, as the Bible does, that God has often chosen the poor and oppressed to forward His will in this world.
- Commit to lasting, not fleeting, relationships. Invest in the relationship by learning about the partner, their country, and their concerns. Avoid mission tourism and impersonal charity.
- Facilitate visits to the U.S., for the good of your whole congregation or community.
- Commit to deepen the relationship and understanding between visits.

By listening to our partners' hopes, concerns and ministries he feels we can best discern how to engage in a meaningful way with our sisters and brothers in these countries.

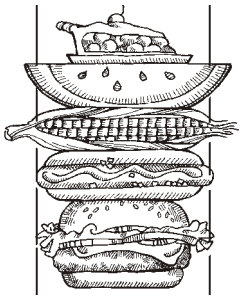
