From the Desk of Rev. Erin Kobs, Organizational Presbyter & Stated Clerk

At the end of last week, the Winter Olympics began in the cities of Milan & Cortina in northern Italy. I absolutely love the Olympics & if I had to choose between the Winter Games & Summer Games, I'd lean towards Winter. I love to watch all the skiing, skating, & of course, the sliding sports of luge, skeleton, & bobsledding. Watching these athletes, I marvel at their skill & dedication to their sport, sometimes at great cost to personal lives, family lives, & even their bodies. My heart broke watching USA Alpine Skier Lindsey Vonn go down with a horrific injury, but I also give her so much credit for giving it one more try. When the athletes marched in for the opening ceremony, in four different locations in northern Italy based on their sports, I cheer a little extra loudly for the countries with one or two athletes knowing what it took for them to be there. The majority of athletes will never see the podium, but they are all Olympians.

What the Olympics symbolize is the gathering of folks from across the globe in one place, at one time. Countries that do not get along with one another, political & social differences - sport brings them together. The camaraderie among them is true & folks walk away from the Games feeling a deeper connection with one another. They trade pins, they share meals together in the Village, they cheer for one another, they congratulate one another even in the face of defeat. Most of all, they exemplify the true meaning of peace. It does not matter who you are or where you are from, there is a commonality & a connection that is established. Peace is a mainstay of the Olympic spirit. People can come together & share in meaning making with one another. Relationship is at the heart of peace.

It seems to me that we can learn something from these athletes. While you & I are likely never going to compete at the Olympic Games (maybe some of our children or grandchildren might!), we can take away the lesson of peace, relationship, & connection with one another across all of our differences. Peace should not just be a part of the Olympic spirit, but rather the spirit throughout all of humanity. Jesus preached peace. Jesus preached about the importance of relationship. Jesus taught us to see one another for who we are - the beloved ones of God. I think Jesus would love the spirit of the Olympic Games. Let's take some lessons from them & from him. I believe it will indeed make the world a better place for all of us.

New Lenten Studies Available at Office

We have several new resources here at the Presbytery office for adult studies for the season of Lent. We have one copy of each book, but we are willing to help get additional resources if needed.

- Turning Over Tables: A Lenten Call for Disrupting Power (Kathy Escobar). This study has videos for group study available. This book invites people to devote the season of Lent to a time of reflection on power. It is both inspiring & challenging, offering Christians a transformative guide to aligning their lives with the way of Jesus, especially on the Lenten journey.
- Living Into Lent (Donald McKim). This has 7 weeks of study materials included in the book. This book sets aside time during the Lenten season for readers to reflect on their Christian identities, listen to God's word & will, & engage in practices that deepen the Christian experience through discipleship.
- Meeting Jesus on the Road (Cynthia Campbell & Christine Coy Fohr). This study comes with videos available on YouTube. The book invites readers to journey alongside Christ through the Gospel stories that define his early path. It offers a meaningful way to engage the season through Scripture, reflection & walking.
- Meeting Jesus at the Table (Cynthia Campbell & Christine Coy Fohr). This Lenten study provides biblical insights along with thought provoking queries regarding our own time eating & communing with others, such as whom we should invite to Sunday dinner & who is left out in our culture today.

2026 Terms of Call & Contracts

The 2026 Terms of Call & Contract forms are now in fillable PDFs on the [Kiski website](#). **All forms are due by January 30, 2026**. The original form must be mailed to the office - no scanned copies via email or photos will be accepted. After they are signed off by the Organization Commission, the original forms will be sent back to the church for your records.

- Without a manse - \$55,550
- With a manse - \$55,500 (\$42,692 salary & \$12,808 manse value)

Congregational Pastor Package

- Pastor only (required for installed pastors) - 17.5% of effective salary
- Additional optional coverage:
 - Pastor & spouse - 17.5% + \$12,250
 - Pastor & child(ren) - 17.5% + \$9,950
 - Pastor & family - 17.5% + \$22,200

Transitional Pastor Package

This is only available to those who were in the package in 2025 & this package will go away in 2028

- Pastor & family - 37% of effective salary

They are: Principles of Financial Reporting, Narrative Budgets, & Reading Church Financial Statements.

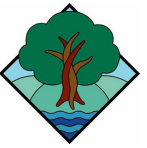
You will need to register in order to view the videos. Registration code is PCUSA.

Fee for pulpit supply (until February 28th) is \$100 plus mileage for one church & \$60.00 each for two churches plus mileage
Starting March 1st, the fee will increase to \$125.00 plus mileage for one church & \$85.00 each for two churches plus mileage
